When we return from the half term break we have two exciting **Parent Forum** sessions on offer for you. The first is a session run by our Early Education Practitioner, Koli, who will be offering you an informative session on helping build **Early Reading** skills. The session will run on **Thursday**

11th November at either **10am or 2pm**. Don't miss out on getting some really valuable advice. The second *Parent Forum* will be on *Outdoor Learning* and will be led by our

Outdoor Education lead and Cooke Room leader, Marcello. This session will be an on-site session and booking is essential as there are very limited spaces. This Parent Forum will run on

Wednesday 17th November at either **10am or 2pm**. This is the first time we are trialing having parents in the provision again so we will ask that you please wear a face mask for the duration of the visit. We will also ask you some covid screening questions as well just to make sure we are protecting our children and staff.

As I spend time in the classrooms I can see the real benefit of our **protected times** and the impact the uninterrupted, small group sessions have on your children and their development. Please makes sure you bring in your child outside of these times as we really don't want you to have to wait! The idea is that during this time the children will not, at all, get interrupted by anyone and that short time gives children the best chance to learn new skills or build their knowledge. You will be receiving the **Initial Assessment** of your child via email which will give you a sense of where we think your child is at developmentally at this moment in time and what things we think we would like to focus on for the rest of the Autumn term. We use an app called "**Evidence Me**" in order to produce these reports and you will have received some correspondence from us about signing up in order to offer some of your own observations of your child's development at home. Wear your Wellies Wednesday

Walking is a great way of keeping active and gives you and your child the chance to see and talk about what's going on in the local neighbourhood.

By walking to nursery you are helping to reduce the numbers of vehicles on the roads, improving air quality of the environment and maintaining social distancing. Wellies are great footwear for playing in the garden during the winter months. So why not put on a pair of your finest Wellies and walk to school on **Wednesday 1st of December 2021**.

Speaking about Wellies, we want to remind you about appropriate clothing and shoes for children who love to play in the rain! Wel-

lington boots are a great resource for your child so their shoes, socks and feet don't get wet. After all, which child can resist jumping in a puddle! Children love playing with water and water play is part of every early years provision, including playing in the rain! If you are particularly worried about your child getting wet, consider all-in-one *waterproofs* for your child; they give your child a lot of freedom in terms of how they play and are super easy to keep clean! Often places like Aldi and Lidl and some other big name supermarkets have these on sale as well; it's worth keeping a look out as you can get them at a really good price. They are also great to use during forest walks in the winter months so you can let your child go on adventures without worrying too much about their clothes!

It's also handy to know what waterproof actually means, as many items of clothing suggest they are waterproof but when put to the test, you can find your child still gets soaked. Clothing should have a waterproof rating: a good waterproof rating: 5,000mm is rain-proof, whereas 10,000 to 15,000 is properly waterproof.

We have sent out a Google Form to you all to find out if you could help support our **Forest School** starting up again which we can only do with parental support. If you haven't yet completed the form, can you please make sure you have done it ASAP so we can make the appropriate plans so we can recommence the sessions after the half term break. Julia Donaldson CBE, is an

English writer, playwright and performer, and the 2011–2013 Children's Laureate. She is best known for her popular rhyming stories for children, especially those illustrated by Axel Scheffler, which include The Gruffalo, Room on the Broom and Stick Man. She originally wrote songs for children's television but has concentrated on writing books since the words of one of her songs, "A

Hair Love

We use books to open up a world of learning for our children. The core books we use relate to children's interests and we feed that through the breadth of activities we offer within the provision. We also think that using books as the base for our learning helps children love reading on a deeper level which we hope they will keep with them throughout their education. We will be using books to enhance key messages we want to impart through our whole nursery and children's centre.

This month our key book is *Hair Love*, written by Matthew A Cherry and illustrated by Vashti Harrison. What a beautiful book that celebrates a loving father/daughter relationship and how they overcome the obstacle of doing his daughter's hair. We love that the book does not assume gender stereotypes and that "dad" plays just as pivotal a role in family life as mum. This story is also important in celebrating difference in hair. Quite shockingly, in the USA, a recent Bill was passed making it illegal to discriminate against natural black hairstyles. It feels quite unbelievable that in some parts of the world in 2020, it has

been necessary to pass law to eradicate hair discrimination. Our hope is that, by incorporating beautiful books such as this one in our school, all our children will see the beau-



ty in someones natural hair gifts and celebrate differences rather than discriminate; and maybe even ask the adult males in their lives to do their hair for them!
