<p>Communicating Through Reading Challenge</p> <p>Go to our school website to watch videos on how to deliver these reading sessions with your child:</p> <p>https://www.rebecacheetham.newham.sch.uk/page/?title=Nursery+at+Home+Keeping+up+our+Development&pid=65</p>	<p>Communicating Through Reading Video 1</p> <p>Select a book to focus on for the whole week with your child. Spend time talking about the front cover, the back cover; focus on the title, the author, the illustrator. Before reading, talk about what the book might be about from looking at the cover. If they have already read the book, you could ask them to recall what happens. Write down their responses to check once you've read through. Read a few pages of the book before stopping and ask what happens next? Write this down to review tomorrow.</p>	<p>Communicating Through Reading Video 2</p> <p>Ask your child to point to the front cover, the back cover, the spine, the title; review who the author /illustrator is and what their job is. Read the book all the way through. Review your child's predictions/recall from yesterday. How did they go? Read through the whole book with your child. Who is their favourite character? What is your favourite part of the story? Can we think of a different ending to the story?</p>	<p>Communicating Through Reading Video 3</p> <p>Read the book again. Ask your child to draw a picture about the book you have just read with them. Talk them through the picture as they draw. Once they have finished you can ask them to describe the picture to you and you can write down what they said about the picture. This gives children a voice and when you write down what they say, it makes children feel their voice is important.</p>	<p>Communicating Through Reading Video 4</p> <p>Read the book again. Choose a letter to focus on (for example, the letter "s") Focus on one page at a time and ask your child to find a word that starts with that letter. When you find a word, write it down for review later. It's great for your child to see you writing for meaning; it helps them see the value of writing. You can focus on the sounds and help your child to recognise the visual sound (by identifying it in the text) and the way it sounds (by reading the words you found).For younger children not ready for this level of scrutiny we will instead encourage your child to point out all the different things that they can see in the pictures - encourage a good level of picking out the detail in a picture. If they get stuck, you can help them out - <i>"Can you find a picture of a bird on this page? Can you show me where the sun is in this picture?"</i></p>	<p>Communicating Through Reading Video 5</p> <p>Ask your child to read the book to you today. Let them take charge of the reading experience. They might use the pictures in the book to help them recall the storyline. We aren't expecting them to be reading the book (unless they can). We are focusing more on their ability to recall and sequence a story. They might surprise you by how much they remember. This helps empower children to want to read independently.</p>

	<p>Collect a few empty bottles (plastic beverage bottles of any size work great), wash them out and weigh them down with a little sand or water. Screw the lids on tight and find a ball that rolls well.</p> <p>You can start with as few as three “bowling pins” and go as high as ten—if you have more, your child will have an easier time knocking them over. Set the bottles up in a triangular setup, with the point facing you, and sit or stand a few feet away.</p> <p>Take turns rolling the ball towards the bottles until they’ve all been knocked over.</p> <p>Between each round, invite your child to help you pick up the bottles. Standing them upright is a fun motor precision challenge, and you can put dot stickers on the floor to indicate where the bottles should go.</p> <p>Please upload photos onto the Evidence me.</p>	<p>Please read a to your child at home. . Please try to ask them some questions in regards to the action, characters, plot etc.</p> <p>What happened first, at the beginning of the story What happened next, in the middle of the story What happened at the end of the story/What happened last?</p> <p>You can help your child with drawing what happened in the story. Write down what your child said when telling you about the story. That with help you to assess your child’s memory skills.</p> <p>You can upload the outcome of your child’s work on the Evidence Me app.</p>	<p>Talk to your child about your national food. What do you like best and why? Do you know different cuisine to yours? Is there anything you like? Talk to your child about different food from other countries. Show them pictures of different food, if possible.</p>	<p>Find different information about Ramadan/Eid in the internet/newspapers/books and talk to your child about Ramadan/Eid celebrations.</p> <p>Write down your child’s voice and take a picture of the poster record it onto the Evidence me.</p>	<p>Talk to your child what they have learnt about patterns at the nursery. Gather skewers and make patterns out of available fruits, e.g. Grapes, strawberries, blueberries.</p> <p>Please upload pictures of your findings onto the Evidence Me.</p>
